An act to amend Section 39719 of the Health and Safety Code, and to add Section-1061 189.7 to the Water Code, relating to water. water, and making an appropriation therefor.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1989, as amended, Jones. Drought: water supply. Water, energy, and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions.

Existing law, the California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006, designates the State Air Resources Board as the state agency charged with monitoring and regulating sources of emissions of greenhouse gases. Existing law requires all moneys, except for fines and penalties, collected by the State Air Resources Board from the auction or sale of allowances as part of a market-based compliance mechanism relative to the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions to be deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund and to be used, upon appropriation by the Legislature, for specified purposes, including the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions associated with water use and supply.

This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board, in coordination with the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission, the Public Utilities Commission, and the Department of Water Resources, to develop and implement a grant and low-interest loan program for water projects that result in the net reduction of water-related greenhouse gas emissions. The bill would continuously appropriate \$200,000,000 annually from the Greenhouse

Gas Reduction Fund to the State Water Resources Control Board to develop and implement the grant and low-interest loan program.

The California Constitution requires the reasonable and beneficial use of water. Existing law requires the Department of Water Resources and the State Water Resources Control Board to take all appropriate proceedings or actions to prevent waste, unreasonable use, unreasonable method of use, or unreasonable method of diversion of water in this state. Existing law authorizes any public entity, as defined, that supplies water at retail or wholesale for the benefit of persons within the service area or area of jurisdiction of the public entity to, by ordinance or resolution, adopt and enforce a water conservation program to reduce the quantity of water used for the purpose of conserving the water supplies of the public entity.

This bill would require the department and the board, by _____, to prepare and submit to the Legislature a report that includes recommendations relating to drought preparedness. The bill would require the department and the board to conduct an annual survey of public and private water suppliers relating to water supply reliability in the event of a drought.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no-yes. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:

3 (a) (1) Water and energy resources are inextricably connected.
4 This relationship is known as the water-energy nexus.

5 (2) The energy used to drive California's water system,

6 including, but not limited to, the fuels used to power groundwater

7 pumps, transportation, treatment and disposal systems for water

8 and wastewater, heating and cooling of water in buildings and

9 other facilities, the delivery of water, and end uses, accounts for

10 nearly 20 percent of the total electricity usage and 30 percent of

11 nonpower-related natural gas consumed, and there are known

12 gaps in quantifying greenhouse gas emissions associated with that

13 energy use.

14 (3) Consequently, saving water saves energy and vice versa.

1 (4) Because the production of energy often results in the 2 emissions of greenhouse gases, there is substantial potential for 3 emission reductions in the water system.

4 (b) While energy use has historically been a fundamental 5 element in the planning and development of California's water 6 supply systems, there are new opportunities for improving this 7 linkage to reduce water-related greenhouse gas emissions. New 8 projects that best serve water and energy investments can maximize 9 greenhouse gas emissions reductions.

10 SEC. 2. Section 39719 of the Health and Safety Code is 11 amended to read:

39719. (a) The Legislature shall appropriate the annual
proceeds of the fund for the purpose of reducing greenhouse gas
emissions in this state in accordance with the requirements of
Section 39712.

(b) To carry out a portion of the requirements of subdivision
(a), annual proceeds are continuously appropriated for the
following:

19 (1) Beginning in the 2015–16 fiscal year, and notwithstanding

20 Section 13340 of the Government Code, 35 percent of annual 21 proceeds are continuously appropriated, without regard to fiscal

22 years, for transit, affordable housing, and sustainable communities

23 programs as following:

24 (A) Ten percent of the annual proceeds of the fund is hereby 25 continuously appropriated to the Transportation Agency for the

26 Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program created by Part 2
27 (commencing with Section 75220) of Division 44 of the Public

28 Resources Code.

(B) Five percent of the annual proceeds of the fund is herebycontinuously appropriated to the Low Carbon Transit Operations

31 Program created by Part 3 (commencing with Section 75230) of

32 Division 44 of the Public Resources Code. Funds shall be allocated

33 by the Controller, according to requirements of the program, and

34 pursuant to the distribution formula in subdivision (b) or (c) of

35 Section 99312 of, and Sections 99313 and 99314 of, the Public

36 Utilities Code.

37 (C) Twenty percent of the annual proceeds of the fund is hereby

38 continuously appropriated to the Strategic Growth Council for the

39 Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program created

40 by Part 1 (commencing with Section 75200) of Division 44 of the

1 Public Resources Code. Of the amount appropriated in this

2 subparagraph, no less than 10 percent of the annual proceeds, shall

3 be expended for affordable housing, consistent with the provisions4 of that program.

5 (2) Beginning in the 2015–16 fiscal year, notwithstanding

6 Section 13340 of the Government Code, 25 percent of the annual

7 proceeds of the fund is hereby continuously appropriated to the

8 High-Speed Rail Authority for the following components of the

9 initial operating segment and Phase I Blended System as described

10 in the 2012 business plan adopted pursuant to Section 185033 of

11 the Public Utilities Code:

12 (A) Acquisition and construction costs of the project.

13 (B) Environmental review and design costs of the project.

14 (C) Other capital costs of the project.

15 (D) Repayment of any loans made to the authority to fund the 16 project.

17 (3) Beginning in the 2017–18 fiscal year, notwithstanding 18 Section 13340 of the Government Code, the sum of two hundred 19 million dollars (\$200,000,000) annually is hereby continuously appropriated from the fund to the State Water Resources Control 20 21 Board to develop and implement the grant and low-interest loan 22 program for water projects that result in the net reduction of water-related greenhouse gas emissions pursuant to Section 189.7 23 24 of the Water Code.

(c) In determining the amount of annual proceeds of the fund
for purposes of the calculation in subdivision (b), the funds subject
to Section 39719.1 shall not be included.

28 SEC. 3. Section 189.7 is added to the Water Code, to read:

29 189.7. (a) The board, in coordination with the State Energy

30 Resources Conservation and Development Commission, the Public

31 Utilities Commission, and the department, shall develop and

32 implement a grant and low-interest loan program for water

33 projects that result in the net reduction of water-related greenhouse34 gas emissions.

(b) Project categories eligible for funding under the programinclude, but need not be limited to, the following:

37 (1) Local water projects, including, but not limited to, water

38 recycling, stormwater capture and reuse, groundwater cleanup,

39 seawater and brackish water desalination, and water conservation.

1 (2) Precision or water efficient irrigation and control 2 technologies.

3 (3) Clean energy generation by water and wastewater treatment 4 plants.

5 (4) Replacement of existing water pumps with more 6 energy-efficient water pumps.

7 (5) Leak detection in water distribution pipelines and associated
8 repairs.

9 (6) Water appliance efficiency.

10 (c) In order to be eligible for funding under the program, 11 projects shall result in the net reduction of water-related 12 greenhouse gas emissions, including, but not limited to, the 13 emissions associated with pumping or transporting water.

(d) In awarding grants or low-interest loans, the board shall
consider whether the proposed project helps achieve the state
policy established in Section 85021 by reducing reliance on the
Delta in meeting California's future water supply needs.

18 (e) Any public moneys made available for the program to private 19 water companies regulated by the Public Utilities Commission 20 shall be used for the benefit of the ratepayers or the public, and

not the investors of the companies, and shall be subject to oversight

22 by the Public Utilities Commission.

23 (f) The board may adopt guidelines it determines are necessary

24 to implement this section. A guideline adopted pursuant to this

25 subdivision is not subject to the rulemaking requirements of

26 Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division

27 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

28 SECTION 1. Section 1061 is added to the Water Code, to read:

29 1061. (a) The department and the board, by _____, shall prepare

30 and submit to the Legislature in accordance with Section 9795 of

31 the Government Code a report that includes recommendations

32 relating to drought preparedness.

33 (b) The department and the board shall conduct an annual survey

34 of public and private water suppliers relating to water supply

35 reliability in the event of a drought.

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
